# FROM KENNETH L. ROBERSON, DIRECTOR



Nina Simone's best-known gifts to us are the three songs, "Mississippi Goddam,""To Be Young Gifted and Black," and "Four Women." These compositions have truly earned the label, "iconic."

Fannie Lou Hamer, Odetta, and Josh White might come to mind when making a list of singer-songwriters who are known for songs of protest. Troubadours with guitar in hand, strumming melodic, social awareness tunes, welcoming their audience to

calmly participate. Nina Simone does not fit in this category; she uses the percussive sound of her grand piano to beat out songs that do not welcome you to participate, but rather dare you not to. She didn't perform songs of social awareness, but songs of protest, like "Mississippi Goddam." Her invitation, if any, was not to be polite. Her music, her voice, was encouraging you to shout to it, to shout out with anger and might. While the civil rights movement informed both her musical identity and personal life in a big way, she would not allow her anger with White America to keep her from celebrating her people in song. "To Be Young, Gifted and Black" and "Four Women" are two products of this celebration. The former song title speaks for itself. Released in 1970, Simone performed it on an episode of "Sesame Street" in 1972, flanked on either side by the souls for whom she recorded it, innocent Black children venturing out into an America that would send them messages to the contrary. The latter song's name is not as obvious.

Simone's composition, "Four Women," puts down the picket sign and holds up a mirror of self-awareness to the face of Black America. The mirror is reflecting the image of four Black female archetypes side-by- side well known in the Black community. Together, they present a complex narrative of class, social status, and, most destabilizing, colorism. It is a song whose truth still shakes up friendships and even families today. Like Simone herself, "Four Women" is a song that took some time to be fully accepted by many looking into the mirror she held up to them. While not as sentimental as "Black and Blue," nor as singular of expression as "Say It Loud, I'm Black and I'm Proud," "Four Women" is memorable because it asks us to break silences between us.

I remember seeing Simone perform not too long before her passing. And she did not disappoint. She was the unapologetically Black and gifted Nina Simone that I'd long wished to see!

# FROM CHRISTA BROWN



The Free Soil Arts Collective is thrilled to be partnering with Merrimack Repertory Theatre for *Nina Simone: Four Women*. Too often the black experience is considered to be just that, a singular black experience. But Christina Ham's work shows the nuances that make the African American struggle so rich, filled with beauty and pain. Ham brings to light issues that still plague the black community today, forces such as racism, prejudice, and social injustice, as well as the privilege/pain

that can be found within colorism, its effects on self-worth, and how it influences how one navigates the world.

Through the stories of these four women, we believe audiences will be given a glimpse into the unmistakable beauty of the Black woman. We also recognize that these portrayals are not perfect, perhaps bordering on stereotypical rather than archetypical, but the most important thing is that these voices be shared, amplified, and somehow lead us to have a thoughtful discourse on what it means to be a Black woman. Every one of their stories deserves to be told.

Founded in January 2019, the mission of the Free Soil Arts Collective is to use theatre as a tool to empower the voices of underrepresented communities. Our name is inspired by the work of the Lowell Free Soil Party to protect the life of fugitive slave Nathaniel Booth in Lowell, MA, in the 1800s. The slogan of the party was free soil, free labor, free men, stating that those who worked the soil deserve to be free. It is our belief that those whose stories are underrepresented in the arts have the right to tell their own stories.

We believe that the women chronicled in *Nina Simone: Four Women* have the right to exist, to tell their truth, and to be portrayed on the stage.

# A GRIPPING NINA SIMONE SONG BECOMES A RIVETING PLAY

In her 1966 original song, *Four Women*, Nina Simone created archetypes of African-American women of the time – in both skin color and station. They express the strife and despair of Black life from four very different perspectives.

For the stage, Christina Ham transformed Simone's four-minute narrative into a fully realized play in response to the bombing of the 16th Street Baptist Church in Birmingham that killed four young girls, and she located the action in the ruins of that church.

The characters are **Aunt Sarah**, a strong, resilient woman, who some say represents enslavement; **Sephronia**, a woman of mixed race forced to live "between two worlds;" **Sweet Thing**, a street prostitute, who can brag, *My hair is fine*; and **Peaches**, a tough, disillusioned woman, who rails in anger at the injustices suffered by her people.

Many fans had long suspected that the character of Peaches is Nina's self-portrait. For the play, Ham transforms Peaches into Nina, who belts the iconic lyrics:

*My skin is brown / My manner is tough / I'll kill the first mother I see / My life has been too rough / I'm awfully bitter these days / because my parents were slaves / What do they call me / My name is PEACHES*

Playwright, journalist, and scholar Thulani Davis described *Four Women* as "an instantly accessible analysis of the damning legacy of slavery that made iconographic the real women we knew and would become. For African-American women it became an anthem affirming our existence, our sanity, and our struggle to survive a culture, which regards us as anti-feminine. It acknowledged the loss of childhoods among African-American women, our invisibility, exploitation, defiance, and even subtly reminded that in slavery and patriarchy, your name is what *they* call you."

She noted that, "For African-American women artists of my generation, 'Four Women' became the core of works to come, notably . . . *For Colored Girls Who Have Considered Suicide When the Rainbow Is Enuf*," as well as works by Alice Walker, Toni Cade Bambara, and Toni Morrison, who said of Simone, "She saved our lives."

Today Simone's *Four Women*, along with *Mississippi Goddam*, *I Wish I Knew How It Would Feel to be Free*, and *To Be Young, Gifted and Black*, still inspires listeners and artists. Samples of Simone songs enliven tracks by Lauryn Hill, Kanye West, and Jay-Z. The 2015 documentary, *What Happened, Miss Simone*?, earned an Academy Award nomination, and The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame inducted the "High Priestess of Soul" in 2018.

Davis proclaimed, "May the High Priestess's cult widen to take in the unwise, who made her as outrageous as she was!"



# NINA'S RESPONSE To Concerns about "Four Women"

"I wrote a song, *Four Women*, which went into these feelings a little. The women in the song are black, but their skin tones range from light to dark and their ideas of beauty and their own importance are deeply influenced by that. All the song did was tell what entered the minds of most black women in America when they thought about themselves: their complexions, their hair – straight, kinky, natural, which – and what

other women thought of them. Black women didn't know what the hell they wanted because they were defined by things they didn't control, and until they had confidence to define themselves they'd be stuck in the same mess forever – that was the point the song made. When 'Four Women' was released in 1966 some black radio stations banned DJs from playing it because they said it 'insulted' black women. It didn't, and banning it was a stupid thing to do, but I wasn't surprised. The song told a truth that many people in the USA – especially black men – simply weren't ready to acknowledge at that time."
